I have a son who was diagnosed with Autism at the age of 3. I've known about Autism Speaks but never thought that I would find myself in need of any assistance. Until, due to unforeseen family emergencies and personal health issues, I found myself almost homeless. I had already found a suitable place to live but I didn't have enough money to pay the security deposit and last month's rent in order to move in. I contacted a representative from Autism Speaks and explained my situation. I was then referred to Autism Speaks Cares because they offered emergency financial assistance to families of children diagnosed with Autism. At first, I was a little confused about the process but the representative patiently explained everything to me. I was able to complete the application requirements online and was contacted in less than a week with news that my circumstances qualified my family for the help we needed. I never thought that my family would ever have to face possibly being displaced, but with help from Autism Speaks and Autism Speaks Cares, I was able secure a home for my family. It's been over a year since we moved and I'm as grateful today as I was then for Autism Speaks helping to make our burden a little lighter.

Doctors discovered Colton suffered from a high grade glioma tumor in September, and shortly after he underwent brain surgery.

Colton's family then turned to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital for his continuing treatment, including chemotherapy.

"St. Jude spares no expense," said Colton's mom, Colleen. "It doesn't matter the cost, they're going to do what's in the best interest of my child. The attitude is not to wait and see if something happens, but rather to make sure nothing happens."

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We've seen a **23%** decline in the cancer death rate since 1991. That's 1.7 million lives saved.

Treatment Decisions

It can be scary when you get those 3 words from your doctor, "You have cancer." Bob first heard those words in January, 2014. He'd had a prostate cancer screening during a routine doctor's visit. The results were suspicious, so the doctor sent Bob to a urologist, who did more tests, including a prostate biopsy, CT scan, and ultrasound. The tests confirmed prostate cancer. The doctor gave him treatment options that included surgery, radiation, or a clinical trial. Bob joined a prostate cancer support group to meet and talk to men who'd been through treatment. He opted for surgery to remove his prostate, after which all signs of cancer were gone.

But about 1 ½ years later at a follow-up visit, the urologist found that Bob's levels were once again elevated. Treatment options were to wait and monitor the cancer, or begin radiation treatment . "When fighting cancer, it's easy to rack up bills fast," says Bob. Once you use cancer insurance, you can't get it again, so when his cancer came back, he didn't have that safety net. However, Bob still began radiation treatment making ends meet with help from his community. After 3 months of radiation, his last test indicated no cancer. Bob knows "Cancer doesn't care what age you are, what color you are, or how much money you have. We are all survivors".

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The Kosmas Family Story: Chelsea, Kris, Olivia, and Ella

After a long and challenging road to pregnancy, Chelsea and Kris Kosma were thrilled to find out they were expecting twin girls. At her 18-week check-up, complications were discovered that required Chelsea to be put on full bed rest for the remainder of her pregnancy.

Ten difficult weeks of hospitalization later, Olivia and Ella were born at 28 weeks and 6 days, weighing less than 3 pounds each. Olivia and Ella were so ill, it was a long and painful 24 hours before Chelsea could hold Olivia and 4 days before she could hold Ella. They spent the next 52 days in the NICU receiving breathing support and blood transfusions, finally coming home in December of 2012.

Today, Olivia and Ella are thriving, happy, smart five-year-olds because of the talented NICU team and the scientific advances funded by March of Dimes.
